




Soccer Explained for Americans

RESTARTING THE PLAY

Based on the Pics and Definitions Provided, Match the Numbers with the Definitions from the Box



1. It is used to restart play after a goal is scored, and is taken by the team that conceded the goal.




2. It is taken from 11 meters out from the goal, on the penalty mark.



3. A goal may be scored directly against the opposing side without the ball having first touched another player. It is awarded when a player commits a foul outside of their own penalty area.



4. It is awarded to the defending team when the ball goes out of the field of play by crossing, without a goal being scored, when the last person to touch the ball was from the attacking team.



5. A goal may not be scored directly from the kick. It is awarded to the opposing team when a player commits a foul other than a penalty foul.



6. It is awarded to the attacking team when the ball leaves the field of play by crossing the goal line (either on the ground or in the air) without a goal having been scored, having been last touched by a defending player.



7. It is taken from the point where the ball crossed the touch-line, either on the ground or in the air.



8. It is awarded when play has been stopped due to reasons other than normal gameplay or misconduct.



9. Kicking the ball high in the air towards the opposite side of the field by the goaltender in.
