



Uluru Australia





Uluru (a.k.a. Ayers Rock) is a large sandstone rock formation in the Northern Territory in central Australia. It lies in the middle of the outback, 335 km south west of the nearest town, Alice Springs. Uluru is sacred to the Anangu, the Aboriginal people. The area surrounding this huge monolith is home to an abundance of springs, caves and ancient paintings – so much so that it is listed as an UNESCO World Heritage Site.

This sandstone monolith stands **348 m** high, rising 863 m above sea level and has a total **circumference of 9.4 km**. Both Uluru and the nearby **Kata Tjuta formation** (25 km west of Uluru) have great cultural significance for the Anangu people, the traditional inhabitants of the area. Uluru is notable for appearing to **change colour** at different times of the day and year, especially when it glows red at dawn and sunset.
