## **Out of Wedlock**

This semantic field illuminates some of the cultural differences between Italy and the Anglo-Saxon world. Wedlock is the state of being married; interestingly, it has derived from the Gothic word for pledge and the Middle English word lock (see picture above), thus conveying the idea of a legally binding promise. Whereas in Italian a child born out of the wedlock used to be referred to as a figlio illegittimo, the English equivalent love child stresses the sentimental implications of the affair, rather than its unlawfulness. In the past the birth of a love child often caused a gunshot marriage: the groom would be forced to get married at gunpoint by the bride's father. This definition highlights the groom's unwillingness to give up on his freedom through the abovementioned wedlock; by contrast, the Italian matrimonio riparatore lays the stress on the mending effect of the sacrament over the sin (supposedly) committed.
