Slang



The first recorded use of slang to indicate 'very informal language characterized by vividness and novelty' was in 1818. Earlier than that, this word had meant 'jargon of a particular profession' (recorded in 1801) and, earlier still, 'special vocabulary of tramps and thieves' (1756).

The origins of the word slang prior to these occurrences is a matter of debate among linguists. Some trace it back to Norwegian slengenamn, 'nickname', slengja kjeften, 'to abuse with words' (literally 'to sling the jaw', related to Old Norseslyngva to sling). This hypothesis would account for the 19th-century American derogatory noun slangwhanger, indicating a ranting partisan or an abusive speaker / writer.
