





1. Clifton, VA (USA): The Bunny Man

Clifton used to be a very peaceful village until the 1970s, when the Colchester Overpass (a Southern Railway overpass spanning Colchester Road near Clifton) started being haunted by a creepy man wearing a rabbit costume and attacking passers-by with an axe. Since then, the overpass has been nicknamed "The Bunny Man Bridge". It is advisable not to have a walk alone there after dark...

2. Brockworth, UK: The Cooper's Hill Cheese-Rolling and Wake

Due to the steepness and uneven surface of the hill on which it takes place, this annual event usually causes a number of injuries, ranging from sprained ankles to broken bones. Cooper's Hill Cheese Rolling has been summarized as "twenty young men chasing a cheese off a cliff and tumbling 200 yards to the bottom, where they are scraped up by paramedics and packed off to hospital".

3. Japan: Sleeping at Work

Whereas dozing on the workplace is viewed as lazy and unprofessional in the Western world, in Japan the custom dictates that if you're sleeping at work, then it means you've been working so hard you haven't been able to get enough sleep at home. This leads employers to believe that the workers are exhausted because they're incredibly dedicated to their job. This practice is so positively connoted that some people even pretend to be asleep to gain favor.





4. Nassau County, FL (USA): The "Lights Out" Initiation Ritual

Since the 1990s, Nassau County (Florida) has been plagued by a number of murders due to a gruesome initiation ritual: street gang members drive without headlights until a compassionate motorist responds with the traditional flashing of headlights, whereupon a new gang member is bound to murder the citizen as a requirement of initiation.



5. Amazon: The "Bullet Ants Glove" Initiation Ritual

Among the Satere-Mawes, an Amazonian tribe, when a young boy becomes sexually mature he goes out into the jungle with the shaman to gather bullet ants, the insect with the most painful sting in the world. The ants are then drugged by the shaman: while sleeping in their drug-induced state, they are placed into a woven mesh glove with the stinger on the inside. When the ants wake up, they find themselves trapped and become very aggressive. The boy then has to wear the glove and keep it on for about ten minutes while he dances to divert his mind away from the pain.





6. Amazon: The Yanomami Burial Ritual

When a Yanomami dies, his body is burned. The ashes and bone powder is mixed into a plantain soup. His people then drink the plantain soup consisting of the dead person's ashes and bones, as they believe that by ingesting the remains of the loved ones, their spirit will live within them forever.



7. Arlington, VT (USA): Cremation Diamonds Made from Ashes

The company "Cremation Solutions" advertises online cremation diamonds made of a beloved person's ashes under the slogan "Live. Love. Remember." They explain that "cremation diamonds are a one of a kind style of cremation jewelry and a meaningful alternative to cremation urns. A true memorial to a unique life. Cremation diamonds provide way to embrace your loved ones memory day by day and quickly become a family heirloom. The cremation diamond is the most unique and timeless cremation jewelry tribute available. Create a testimony to their unique life."





8. Punxsutawney, PA (USA): Listening to a Weather-Forecasting Rodent

On February 2nd, the people of Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, gather to observe a groundhog called Phil emerge from his burrow. If Phil sees his shadow, there will be six more weeks of winter. If not, you can expect an early spring. "Groundhog Day" dates back to 1886, and apparently there has only been one Punxsutawney Phil. He owes his great age to a closely guarded punch recipe.



9. Long Beach, CA (USA): Midget Town

After the success of the 1939 American musical fantasy film *The Wizard of Oz*, many of the little people (commonly known as "midgets" in English) who had acquired their wealth by playing the roles of the munchkins, purchased lots in the La Linda development of Long Beach, and built homes sized to suit their needs. La Linda affectionately became known as "Midget Town" and the proximity of the La Linda development to the studios allowed them to work many supporting casts in the movies from the 1940s on.


